This Week in ELA:

In independent reading, we began learning about our super reading power that helps us track print: pointer power. We move our finger under each word, giving one point for every word we read. In writing workshop, we practiced stretching and writing words to make our stories better. We used our imaginary rubber band and an alphabet sound chart to help us. If we are trying to write the word "pumpkin" right now, it may look like more like this: pkn. We applaud that! We focused on letters Mm and Dd this week. Our "monkey alphabet card" and "dinosaur alphabet card" will help us remember these sounds. Our sight words this week were: has and had. These can be trickier words, so any at-home reinforcement you can give would be wonderful!

This Week in Math:

Students practiced writing numerals 9 and 10. We also counted objects in various arrangements-circular, scattered, and arrays. As we counted objects, we noticed our "counting path" to get to that number. We connected our objects with lines to show how we counted.

This Week in Science:

We studied pumpkins! We know that pumpkins come in many colors and sizes, they grow on vines, and they come from seeds. We even got to see, smell, and feel the inside of a pumpkin. Most of us thought the pulp felt gooey and sticky!
