This Week in ELA:

We reviewed our vowels. We listened really hard to see if we could decipher between the long and short sounds. For example in the word <u>top</u>, we heard short o. In the <u>rope</u>, we heard long o. We also learned about pronouns, or words that replace a noun. Instead of saying, "**Mrs**. **Mckenna** and **Ms**. **Moskowitz** are great teachers," we can say, "**They** are great teachers." © Our poem this week was even about pronouns! We continued using Book Talk power and practiced retelling our story books by talking about who was in the story, where they were, and sequentially explaining what happened. We also learned sight words *was*, *with*, and *for*. We practiced signing the words, dribbling them, and spelling them. In writing workshop, we continued writing our speeches. Next week is all about revision and practice for Friday!

This Week in Math:

We completed timed 'sprints' to practice fluent adding and subtracting within 5. We also continued to solve addition problems within 9 and 10. We drew pictures, wrote number sentences, and filled in number bonds. Let your child show you "partners" of each number. (For example, 6 and 3 are partners of 9.)

This Week in Science:

We continued to learn about different animal habitats and the types of homes animals make in these places. This week, we looked at grasslands/prairies, rainforests, and deserts. We also read The Great Kapok Tree, a fictional story about sustaining the rainforest habitat.
