We continued to look at teen numbers, counting them in different configurations. Specifically, we counted them in circles and arrays. We also practiced "counting on" from a number. If there were nine dots and we needed to make 17, we had to count on to make the bigger number. Keep practicing writing teen numbers with your child, ensuring that the "1" is always in the front!

We saw so many different animals at the zoo. Ask your child about the animals he/she saw. See if he/she can tell you which animals were oviparous and what that big word means!
